

It takes all kinds of folks in Master Gardeners, even those who prefer clean hands.

I have no gardening genes; my interest came from reading newspaper articles. My grandmother in Starkville, MS, grew bulbs and vegetables, and the one near Tupelo, MS, grew roses and vegetables. I admired the flowers but hated their vegetable gardens. Growing up, I shelled some peas because the stories about my relatives' escapades were pretty good but after the third year hearing the same stories, I grew bored. I much preferred reading, especially mysteries and biographies. I still like mysteries and biographies. My mother wanted nothing to do with the yard, but my father did cut the grass and plant tomatoes and squash. Now I cut the grass, and my husband, who grew up on a Mississippi Delta farm, handles the vegetables and herbs. I got him to use hydroponics and to put the water for the containers on a timer.

I graduated from Mississippi State in 1973, a few years before Harvey Cotten and John Grisham, with a degree in communication with emphases in newspaper journalism and communication theory. After eloping as soon as my parents paid my last semester's tuition, Tom Hales and I graduated and moved. I worked at the Memphis, TN, *Commercial Appeal* and the Houston, TX, *Chronicle*. My favorite job at the *Chronicle* was copyediting and writing head-lines for The Lazy Gardener column. We moved to my husband's hometown, the severely impoverished Greenville, MS, and I worked at the *Delta-Democrat Times*. Two children later, in 1979, in search of great public schools and a great economy, we moved to Huntsville.. Paradise!

I spent some years as a stay-at-home mom, volunteering with PTAs and children's sports teams as my husband built houses. I helped found the Hampton Cove Garden Club (I had to learn to maintain the homestead), and graduated to the Garden Clubs of North Alabama. I served 10 years with the City of Huntsville Beautification Board, including working on the 2000 sign ordinance. During this time, I took the Master Gardener course, discovered I liked land-scaping public parks, and went to work for the Huntsville Times. I quickly claimed editing Harvey Cotten's weekly columns and John Ehinger's bird columns. I also wrote headlines and kept the arts calendar. I was part of the 70% who were laid off in 2012.

I really don't enjoy getting my hands dirty but I like knowledge about gardening and facilitating what plants want to do. I tell my children that unlike computers, family members and co-workers, plants want to do what's right. I continue to work with nearby towns' beautification judging. After taking the Master Gardener course in 2005, I pulled out lots of yard plants, but my yard doesn't look much better now. I do have some of my grandmother's daffodil bulbs. I did follow in the paths of my grandmother (the bulb grower) and mother and play duplicate bridge.

My favorite Master Gardener experience: The tour of Hudson Alpha My favorite Master Gardener tip: Cut your Amazon boxes to fit and put between the soil and mulch. No sunshine on soil equals no weeds.

Morris Elementary

Morris Elementary School has given MGNA an opportunity to provide gardening instructions to Ms. Pride's 4th grade class during the school year. We began our first class with the students after Labor Day. Our meeting times are Wednesdays from 1-2 pm.

The class has been divided into four groups by color. They are Red, Blue, Yellow, and Green Teams. The students have been assigned to a team by Ms. Pride. They will remain with the same team for the school year. Students have been equipped with aprons and garden journals that are color coded to their group. Adult volunteers will remain with the same group for the year.

The instruction and activities are based on Alabama School Garden curriculum and the Junior Master Garden program. Activities are in alignment with Alabama standards in Science, Math, and English.

We began our first class by introducing types of soils: clay, sand and garden soil from one of their assigned raised beds. The students also included compost in the comparisons.

Students placed equal amounts of the soil samples from the previous week with an equivalent amount of water in a jar with a lid. They shook the jar to combine ingredients, then set that jar aside until the end of class for the contents to settle. They discussed and recorded observations.

Students used a funnel and catch container constructed from a 2-liter clear plastic soda bottle. First they added their sample to the funnel, then equal amounts of water, and timed at set intervals. Students filled out a comparison chart in their garden journal.

We also harvested sweet potatoes, planted transplants of broccoli, cabbage, Brussels sprouts, cauliflower, lettuce and kale.
